First Angel:


Fear not, shepherds, for I bring

Talking to your child about online safety

Advice on how to start the conversation and get support if you're worried.

Online life and offline life is just life

For many of us, we see our online lives and offline lives as different, but children are growing up with technology and the internet and for them there isn't a difference; online life and offline life is just life.

Technology can move at an extraordinarily fast pace and it can be difficult to know how to start talking to your child about what they're doing online, who they might be speaking to or discussing the potential risks and issues.

Starting the conversation

Talking regularly with your child is the greatest tool to help keep them safe online. Talking regularly and making it part of daily conversation, like you would about their day at school, will help your child feel relaxed. It also means when they do have any worries, they're more likely to come and speak to you. But it can also be easy to become overwhelmed with the different technology, the language that children use, the huge number of games and apps which are available and the potential risks.







Today, children from Ivy Bee Class were pleased to welcome Abbie Morris, a local farmer, and Robyn Munt, the secretary for the National Farmers Union, to the school. This formed part of the class Geography topic on global food production.

After a presentation about different grains grown on the Island, the children asked lots of questions to find out what it is like to be a farmer. They discovered which crops are grown on the farm - an amazing 14 different vegetables and grains. They began to understand the importance of buying local produce as this keeps down the 'food miles' and supports local businesses on the Island.

The life of a farmer is a hard one with little time for holidays. A working day can start at 7.00am and go through to 6.00pm or later if livestock is involved, yet quite a few children felt they would like a career in farming when they are older.

There is a pop-up vegetable shop, run by Abbie, in Shorwell, so if you get a chance, pop along for some fresh local produce and support British farming.

Privilege Seat Application Window – Academic Year 2022/2023

Dear Parent/Guardian

The dates for the <u>griyilege_seat_application_window</u> for academic year 2022 have been finalised. Should you wish to apply for a privilege seat for your child to use the school bus service you will need to apply from **9am on Tuesday 6th**December 2022 Please note that the online form will be live until on or around 5th June 2023

Please also note the FAQs, Code of Good Practice and Ticket Terms and Conditions sections available via this webpage. If you scroll to the bottom of the above webpage you will see the bus services for which you can apply. This information will be live from 9am on Tuesday 6th December 2022. Should the service you require not be listed you will not be able to apply for that service at this time.

Do bear in mind that making an application for a privilege seat does not guarantee a seat on the school bus.


Privilege seat ticket prices are set costs as follows.

- Up to a full term £130.00
- Up to half a term £65.00
- Up to a full-term AM or PM only £65.00
- Up to half a term AM or PM only £32.50

Important Points to Note

- Information on bus services that can be offered will be available on the website from 9am on Tuesday 6th December 2022.
- We may not be able to provide an update on the number of seats available before the application window opens but please be aware seats availability will be very limited.
- Services available are listed at the bottom of the Privilege seat webpage
- There will be a strict payment deadline for making payment. Should you miss this deadline, the seat offered to your child will be offered, to the next child on the waiting list (should one exist) and your application will be cancelled.
- Once applications have been processed by the Transport Team you will be able to see the status of your application online as well as make payment without having to contact the Council.
